By the time this autumn edition of Heritage is published, the Heritage Canada Foundation will be settling nicely into our new and permanent home.

For the last three years, the foundation has been renting space in the old Dominion Observatory on the Central Experimental Farm in Ottawa, but the lease expired this summer and could not be extended. When we began looking for new accommodation, we discovered that appropriate rental

properties were scarce and expensive, so we explored heritage properties for sale. We found, to our delight, a handsome building in the Sandy Hill neighbourhood of Ottawa which was less expensive to purchase and operate than comparable rental space.

Our new home dates back to circa 1897, and was for nearly fifty years the headquarters of the Victorian Order of Nurses. Built for the Blackburn family, the house stands at the corner of Laurier Avenue East and the street that bears the family name, Blackburn Avenue. The Blackburn family occupied the house until the 1950s, then deeded it to the V.O.N., which has grown too large for the building and has moved to bigger premises. The next edition of our magazine will feature an article on our new home, with accompanying photographs.

Visitors are more than welcome, so do plan to drop in when next in the neighbourhood. It will be a pleasure to greet you and give you a guided tour of the new home for the Heritage Canada Foundation.
