In the cases of London and Orangeville, Ontario, factors came together to reverse that trend when two Victorian-era row houses were successfully restored. Both stories reveal just how vital municipal financial incentives have become to the success of this process.

Conversely, the unanticipated and shocking results of the City of Toronto's Preservation Board's decision to consider the designation of a rare architectural example of the Modern Movement, the Engholm-Fry House, reveal just how powerless municipalities really are in preserving their own heritage. Determined to prevent the designation, the owner took the drastic step of destroying the unique exterior features of the house with a sledgehammer, claiming his "renovation" did not require a permit. The sad story of this house's history is told in "Rare Example Of Modern Heritage Threatened In Etobicoke."

I am very pleased to introduce myself as the new editor of Heritage magazine.
