Recently, the interim report of the Prime Minister's Caucus Task Force on Urban Issues was released, and I am pleased to say that the Task Force devoted attention to the importance of preserving our heritage and went on to recommend that the federal government provide grants to support the restoration and conversion of heritage properties and develop mechanisms to encourage redevelopment for both commercial and residential purposes. A final report will be released later this year, and the Heritage Canada Foundation will be supplementing its earlier input with a further submission to the Task Force. In the meantime, I have written to Judy Sgro, MP, the chair of the Task Force, to thank her and her caucus colleagues for the reference and recommendation contained in the report.
