The decision to put one of Frank Johnston's evocative WWI paintings on the cover is a departure from our usual practice of using photographs. It depicts the historic CFB Borden hangar line from 1917 and the biplanes that Canada's and Britain's first military pilots trained in like no other image found. That only eight hangars of that famous line remain—now a national historic site—is a symptom of the general disregard for the heritage of our military places.

At the end of 2003, as the world celebrated the centennial of flight, DND announced plans to demolish three more of the Borden hangars. Our Endangered Places story covers the details beginning on page 17.
